# OLD BASEBALL FIELD Prospect Hill

















These two maps show approximately where the baseball field was located. Compare them with the picture on the first page.

"Show days came to an abrupt and early close this summer when tragedy in the nature of a fire estimated at \$100,000 staged an unscheduled performance yesterday afternoon. Books and money kept in the business office were destroyed as was 6 valuable paintings and scenery and equipment. The fire broke out shortly after the afternoon matinee"
