

Missing Main Street Store

Those of us that grew up in the 40s and 50s remember this store as Cruickshanks Hardware Store. There is a lot more history to it before Roy Cruickshank ran it. It was located on the corner of North Main and Water Streets where Allen and Palmer's parking lot is today.




It was a wood frame building, built in the 1860s. It is shown on the 1868 map, owner; W. A. Smith. Smith ran it as a General Merchandise dealer. His son, Albert J Smith carried on with the General Merchandise. Later succeeded by Albert's two sons: William. and George reduced the stock to groceries.

Charles Van Brocklin opened a restaurant in the building, followed by George Horton. Neil Morrison then had a billiard parlor there.

I'm not sure when Roy Cruickshank bought it, but I know he was there in the 50's. Roy ran it as a Doughboy Hardware until 1963.

Melvin Kinney bought Cruickshanks in 1963 and moved into the apartment over the store. Bill Conover bought it next and used it for storage for the Allen and Palmer hardware. In the late 70s the building was deteriorating so much, it was torn down. It is now a parking lot for the Allen and Palmer Hardware.




Here it is just north of the old Oneida market. Water Street ran between.




Loading big pine in the Adirondacks

The picture of the Zina Wilson Family was taken by Arlene Renee Carr's grandfather John W. Trevett not her greatgrandfather.




Entrance to Prospect Hill Cemetery 1920
