

JACKWAX

If you've never had it, it's time you did, especially those of you in the North Country. What is it? Ever had taffy? Here's the recipe for it. Boil real maple syrup until it 'hairs' (makes a string when dripping from a spoon) Drizzle onto a pan of fresh snow. Within seconds it's a taffy-like candy. Poke a fork in it, eat and enjoy.



For many years, maple trees have been tapped and the sap boiled down to the consistency for maple syrup. Many farmers and country folks boiled the sap for their own use, and there were many that sold the syrup, maple cream, and maple candy as a business. To mention a few local maple-sugar operations: Edwards, Bradt, Duesler, Lent, Ginter, and Cramer.


